

The story of Esther is a most remarkable account of how God in His providence saved His people. It's an unusual story to be included in the Bible because, as you may know, it doesn't include any reference to God—yet His fingerprints are all over it. This is the story of several million people who were disobeying God by not returning to the land of Israel as He had commanded them to. Now they're out of the will of God.

The record of these people, this large number of Jews, is the book of Esther. It's just one page out of their history; one small item of their experience, and one scrap and shred of evidence in their voluminous records. But in this little book we see God directing them by His providence. They had forgotten Him; they were far from Him, but Esther teaches the romance of His providence. That is how God directs this material universe in which we live today. In fact, it's the way He directs all of His creation.



Let's pick up the action in the throne room, palace, and banquet hall of the great king Xerxes of Media-Persia, one of the world rulers of a great world empire. He was planning a campaign against Greece at that time and had called in all the leaders of the 127 provinces of his kingdom.

Then something happened he didn't anticipate: His gueen refused to come at his command. It was a family scandal, and something had to be done. So she was set aside. This king then made his campaign against Greece. He came back home, retired in absolute humiliation and defeat. His servants wanted to do something to cheer him up so they suggested a beauty contest that would bring in the most beautiful women of all the kingdom's provinces.

As we look into this story in the palace, I see nothing spiritual there. It's as godless as anything possibly could be. It's a drunken orgy that's taking place. But God's overruling it. And now we're beginning to see what this book teaches. It teaches the providence of God. And God was arranging these events so that, at the proper time, He'd have someone there to intervene on behalf of His people. God is moving the story into His rescue tomorrow.

Now we're introduced to this man, Mordecai. He belonged to the royal family of Israel, the family of Saul. He must have been a little boy at the time of his capture, but now he's grown and serving in the palace in some capacity. Mordecai cared for his cousin, Esther (whose name means "star" and who was apparently a very beautiful woman).

God's name isn't written in this story, but you'll see His fingerprints are here. And not only that but someone has defined "providence" as "the hand of God in the glove of circumstances." And, believe me, His hand's moving the glove of circumstances. And friend, that's true in your life and it's true in my life also.

Providence means "to provide." God will provide. You remember what Abraham said on top of Mount Moriah when Isaac said, "Where is the sacrifice?" Abraham said, "God will provide" (see Genesis 22:7-8). God provided two thousand years after Abraham on the top of that same ledge that goes through Jerusalem. On Golgotha, the Lord Jesus Christ was crucified. God provided a Lamb where "...the Lamb of God who takes away the sin of the world" (John 1:29) was offered. God provides.

Think of providence as the hand of God in the glove of human events. That means God is the backseat driver. He's the coach who calls signals to the runner on second base. That's the way providence moves. He's the unseen rudder on the ship of state. He's the pilot at the wheel during the night watch. And as someone has said, "He makes great doors swing on little hinges."

By God's providence, Esther came to the throne. And because Esther came to the throne, it enabled her to intervene and intercede on behalf of her people. And an entire people would have been exterminated at that time had she not been there. In the book of Esther, we're going to find out one night a king couldn't sleep and he didn't have any aspirin tablets, so he read some records. And it's a good thing he read them because it changed the destiny of a people.

That's providence. And we'll see God's providence come to light over and again in this book.

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IN THIS STORY, BUT YOU'LL SEE HIS

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- 1) What do you love so far about this true story?
- 2 It happens in most every great story. Things look bleak ... but then something happens. This is God's providence at work. Can you think of a time in your life as you look back that you now see God was at work? Describe what happened.
- 3 The setting of the book of Esther is Persia, after God commanded His people to return to Israel. How have you seen God at work in circumstances where people were living outside His will? Was He still gracious and kind? Was He still involved? What could have been the cost? The blessing?

4 One of the lessons we can learn about God from Esther's story is "silence doesn't mean He's not there." How does this reality impact your thinking about your own story? About history in general?

5 If you love history, you'll be interested to know that the events of the book of Esther (483-473 B.c.) happen during an intense season of wars in world history. Explore online outlets for world history timelines to find out more, especially how King Xerxes impacted the world stage. Some other historical people also lived and died in this time range, including Buddha in India and Hippocrates, the father of modern medicine, in Greece.


NEW FORMATS INVITE NEW LISTENERS WORLDWIDE

When we began our global ministry 50 years ago, listening habits were very different than they are today.

I remember the story from a family in Manus, Brazil, who got up at 5 a.m. to listen to THRU the BIBLE on the radio. Today, we have so many other



In these changing climates, we never adapt the Word, but instead just how we deliver it. With these short programs—like Minute with McGee



that launched this year and a five-minute program that airs globally—we invite people to listen to the full 30-minute program.

And often, as we know, it's easy to get hooked. In India, one of our producers who has twice recorded the entire five-year program and who is now working on a short form program assures us that Dr. McGee's key message is not being lost.

For THRU the BIBLE's first decades, we delivered the program by broadcast radio. Today, many formats are available. We're all so excited about this—especially our global partners where broadcast radio is not the best option. We'll use every format we can!

One format you have at your fingertips are the new Bible Companions, which are Dr. McGee's teaching content summarized.

These have been recorded in other languages and are now heard as five-minute programs in Mongolia, Cambodia, Malaysia, and in six countries in Europe. In some countries, the short program airs in the morning and teases the full program at night. In Europe people can listen to both short and long programs on a variety of digital outlets like WhatsApp,

In Europe, one producer told us they have over 6,000 people listening daily to the full length program on WhatsApp. Most of these listeners were introduced to THRU the BIBLE by hearing the short form program.

In all of this transition, our vision is still the same: Take the "whole Word to the whole world." Let's pray together that all formats will achieve the goal of bringing people into a closer relationship with our Savior. God can speak into anyone's heart, no matter the length of the study.

We praise the Lord for the incredible content Dr. McGee gave us in the source material to create these new, innovative, and inviting tastes of the Living Word. JESUS IN Esther

It's remarkable that in Esther, a book of the Bible, the name of God isn't ever mentioned. Neither is prayer. And the book is never quoted in the New Testament, not even in a casual reference. The book is also named after a woman—a rarity for sure.

The beauty of the book of Esther is the romance of God's providence—how God directs our universe. In fact, it's the way He directs all of His creation.

Back in Deuteronomy 31, God outlined Israel's history for them. He told them about how Jerusalem would be destroyed, how they would be taken in the Babylonian captivity, and then it would happen again in the Roman captivity. And it actually happened that way. God says in Deuteronomy 31:18 that they were sent into captivity because of their idolatry, and now He says, "I'm going to hide My face from them."

In the book of Esther, God has hidden His face from them. But we can say, "God stands in the shadows keeping watch over His own" (see also Deuteronomy 32:10). **Though they are not in His will, we see God directing them. How? By His providence. They forgot God; they're far from Him. They didn't call on Him or praise Him. But He never left them.**

Providence is how God directs all things—both animate and inanimate, seen and unseen, good and evil—toward a worthy purpose. **Providence is the means by which God's will finally prevails.** (See Ephesians 1:11.)

So our God is running the universe today, friends. Many of us think it has slipped out from under Him, but it hasn't. Who's running it? Well, the Lord Jesus Christ is, upholding all things by the word of His power. His hand is in the glove of human events. He's the coach on the sidelines calling signals to the runner on second base. That's the way providence moves. Jesus Christ is the unseen rudder on the ship of state. He's the pilot at the wheel during the night watch.

God's name may not be mentioned in the book of Esther, but He's on every page, directing the events of history to accomplish His will.
